

OFCO Complaint Issues 713 Complaints received in 2023-24



OFCO Complaint Investigation Outcomes

No violation of law, policy or court order	65%
OFCO monitored complaint to ensure resolution	14%
OFCO intervened to ensure compliance with Law, Policy or Court Order	12%
Complaint resolved without OFCO action	6%
Complaint outside OFCO's jurisdiction	3%

OFCO Complaint Investigations-Adverse Findings

OFCO made 39 Adverse Findings in 18 investigations

Parents' Rights	14 findings	
Casework Practice	5 findings	
Family Separation	3 findings	
Other	2 findings	
Caregiver	1 findings	

Systemic Issues-57% Decrease in Placement Exceptions

Where did Placement Exceptions Occur?

Placement Type	2023	2024
Hotel	1,988	165
Night to Night Foster Care	790	246
DCYF Leased Facility	1,792	2,212

Placement Exceptions

- For 63% (136) of children experiencing a placement exception, DCYF identifies a suitable placement within 1-5 days.
- However, 16% (34) children spent 20 or more nights in placement exceptions. These children are generally older, 10- 17 years of age, and have complex needs.
 - These 34 children account for over 70% of all placement exceptions.

Placement Exceptions

Recommendations:

- Expand Emerging Adulthood Housing Program
- Expand Licensed Receiving Care Resources
- Prioritize Regions 4 and 6.

Juvenile Rehabilitation Oversight

This past year, OFCO received several complaints regarding safety and welfare of youth in JR facilities.

- Overcrowding
- Unsanitary living conditions
- Physical Safety
- Substance Abuse
- Lack of programs

Juvenile Rehabilitation

OFCO's statutory authority over JR is unclear.

Who investigates complaints about JR?

- DCYF Licensing Division investigates allegations of child abuse or neglect of incarcerated youth but JR facilities are not licensed.
- JR internal review procedures include:
- Informal resolution between youth and JR staff
- Written complaint process and JR facility response
- Critical Incident Review Team- Reviews use of force and other critical incidents.


Juvenile Rehabilitation Oversight

Recommendations:

- Establish a Formal Hearing Process and a Uniform Grievance procedure within JR
- Modify RCW 43.06A clarifying OFCO's duties and responsibilities regarding youth and young adults in JR facilities.


